
### Sixteenth Sunday after Trinity

LUKE 17: 5-10 and 2 Timothy 1:1-14


"Heavenly Father, through weak human words, give us grace to hear your true and living Word, Jesus Christ our Lord"

The apostles ask Jesus to increase their faith.

Imagine: they have been with Jesus, they have seen the miracles, they have seen God's son and yet, and yet, they still need more Faith. They still doubt and struggle to understand what is required of them.

We are so often faced with challenges and difficulties in our lives. We are often tested in our lives and at times we may have to ask Jesus for more faith to get us through.

At times we may be cross with God that he has given us such difficult things to contend with. We are obsessed with being in control and forget that actually God is in control and all we have to do as Saint Paul tells Timothy, 'Rekindle the gift of God that is within you'.



We need to trust and rely on the power of God; we are the heralds the anostles and the teachers but the impost

are the heralds, the apostles and the teachers, but the imposter inside us means we also need, like the apostles to ask for more Faith.

To trust in God and the journey he has ordained for us but Jesus knows it isn't easy but he reassures us. He asks us o walk with Him in prayer and to keep praying and to name our worries and fears.

Because when we stand in the Faith of God, our Fear has no hold.

Christ tells them not to be worried, that God's power is so huge and great that a little faith is strong enough to work miracles.

Our service to God is to be done with gratitude and humility. We serve God with love; he needs no proof and evidence, he does not need us saying 'Look at me, how much I have done for you'. We call it virtual signalling.

Think of those faithful people you know in your life who never need to say, 'I have done this or that, aren't I holy?!' They simply quietly serve and rejoice in the love God gives us always.

Our lives need to be of service and of hospitality, yet we are obsessed with status, we see it all around us.

A man once wrote a book, 'Humility and how I achieved it.' It is not fashionable to be humble, it is an old-fashioned concept. Humility is a paradox, but it is an example of what the servants of Jesus must learn. We are loved and humble before God and are delighted in his grace and power in our lives. That is enough. That is hard for us to accept.

We serve God, not according to our own needs but for God's purposes and plan. And yet we struggle to stay in control and insist we are right; we don't listen to the Holy Spirit or we hear but don't want to listen.

It is a privilege to serve God, it needs no further reward. Just enjoy His love and live with joy in your heart. Even on the bad days because that's when the riches of faith will move mountains.



## A wind is blowing - says Danny Kruger

## British MP delivers a bold call for national Christian renewal—to an empty chamber

Immediately prior to joining Reform UK, Danny Kruger, a long-time conservative MP from East Wiltshire, delivered a powerful message concerning the fundamental importance of *Christianity* to the UK's vitality and very existence.

On 17 July Kruger began, "It is an honour to stand here in this empty Chamber to speak about the original purpose of this space, when it was a chapel in the Church of England."

Giving an important history lesson, Kruger explained to essentially no one listening at the time, "When I speak of the Church of England today, I am not speaking about the internal politics of the Anglican sect; I speak of the common creed of our country, the official religion of the English and the British nation, and the institution—older than the monarchy, and much older than Parliament—which made this country."

Kruger was reminding his country not just of its past, but its founding and vitality, that which gave it its influence in the world. This includes the spread of a common language, learning, and an understanding of basic human rights.

Christianity has played a major, formative role in the development of England, Scotland, and Wales since its arrival in the British Isles in the first century, eventually replacing its dark and deadly paganism.

Kruger echoed this in his speech, proclaiming, "The story of England is the story of Christianity operating on a people to make the institutions and culture that have been uniquely stable and successful."

#### Internally confused and badly led

Kruger then bluntly explained how this is no longer the case. That influence is being squandered because England, through its increasingly lifeless and apostate Church, has lost its way and moral influence.

He thundered, "It is no surprise that both the Church and the country itself are in a bad way, divided, internally confused and badly led." He added, "The country itself reflects

that—unclear in its doctrines and its governance, profoundly precarious, chronically exposed to threats from without and within."

This failure has broad consequences: "It is at risk economically, culturally, socially and, I would say, morally."

#### Ghastly slide

He then boldly reminded his nation how ghastly this slide has been of late. "Last month, in the space of three days in one infamous week, this House authorized the killing of unborn children—of nine-month-old babies—and it passed a bill to allow the killing of the elderly and disabled."



Kruger was modelling a modern-day William Wilberforce (pictured left), reminding his nation of their duty to stand for and protect the basic human rights of the most obviously oppressed.

He gave his nation a lesson in their shared responsibility of governance.

He then gave his nation a lesson in their shared responsibility of governance. "There is a great hunger in society for a better way of living, and I want to use this opportunity to explain what that better way is and why we here in England have the means to follow it."

This is a message very close to the daily work and thinking of Kruger, who is also the author of Covenant: The New Politics of Home, Neighbourhood and Nation (Forum, 2023).

"The Jewish and Christian God is a God of nations" Kruger noted. Not a nation, but nations, plural. God is a god of peoples and their value and dignity.

He mourned that this idea is now being threatened by two new influences in his country: Islam and "one that does not have a proper name," explaining that he doesn't think "'woke' does justice to its seriousness."

Christians throughout the world should note Kruger's observation. Of his own country, Kruger held, "this is a Christian country—if it is a country at all—and I cannot be indifferent to the extent of the growth of Islam in recent decades."

#### Elitist attitudes and "progressive" ideologies focused on social and political injustice

It is the other nameless one that concerns him even more, as it is "a combination of ancient paganism, Christian heresies and the cult of modernism, all mashed up into a deeply mistaken and deeply dangerous ideology of power that is hostile to the essential objects of our affections and our loyalties: families, communities and nations."

It is this belief system that has led to the most severe loss of basic human rights and freedoms in his country. Its influence is felt throughout the West.

He continued, "That religion, unlike Islam, must simply be destroyed, at least as a public doctrine."

He told his nation and its leaders, "I suggest we worship the God who came in the weakest form, Jesus Christ." For that is the faith that made his nation great, and that influence spread to the rest of the world.

"A new restoration is needed now" Kruger resolved.

His words are true for all nations and all peoples. We should all heed them in our nations, homes, and lives. May we pray for more clear thinking, strong voiced leaders like Danny Kruger MP.


## **Amazingly** the former Bishop of Oxford does not agree that now is the time to "placard the claim that we are a Christian country"





## Carole played the harmonium in Little Wenham Church's Evensong. She brilliantly explores its provenance

She explains: It is some years since the harmonium was played at a service there - Gill Williams remembers her mother playing it when the choir sang at an evensong, probably 15-years ago or so. But we

don't think it has been played at a service since then.



The harmonium has definitely seen better days - it was very dusty when I went to practise the music the previous week, and several of the notes were sticking and unplayable. However, it behaved reasonably in the service and the choir were glad of the accompaniment.

There are 2 interesting plaques on the harmonium, so I thought I would try and find some more information online, if I could.

The name of the maker was Alexandre Pere et Fils, of 39 Rue Meslay, Paris. The firm was one of the major French harmonium makers of the 19th century. Jacob Alexandre founded an accordion and harmonica company in Paris in 1820, and started producing harmoniums in 1843. They were sold as "melodeum organs". Jacob's son Edouard joined the firm soon afterwards.

Alexandre Pere et Fils' office was at 39 Rue Meslay, Paris, from 1851 to 1860, so the Little Wenham instrument must have been made during that time. A very similar organ on the Reed Organ Society website is dated at 1857. In 1860, after considerable expansion, a new factory was opened at Ivry-sur-Seine.



The second plague on the harmonium reads:



- "Exposition universelle de Paris 1855 Medaille d'honneur a Alexandre Père et Fils.
- The firm was awarded a medal of honour at the 1855 World's Fair in Paris. (This fair was similar to the Great Exhibition in London, held four years earlier.)

## According to the Illustrated Times of London on 6 June 1863:

As an instrument for sacred purposes, the harmonium certainly possesses many important claims upon our notice. In small country churches, where there are no funds to purchase an organ, or where – if a patron be found to present one – an organist could not be paid, the

harmonium ably supplies its place.



As regards the player, there is no difficulty - the vicar's lady or the family governess, by the aid of a small guidebook and a few days' practice, will become perfectly competent to accompany the simple psalms and chants.

A few chords that produce no effect on a pianoforte make a "heavenly sound" upon the harmonium. Indeed, the small skill required in its performance is one great charm of this instrument.

Carole adds: We don't know when the harmonium was installed in Little Wenham church, but it is unlikely to have been before 1920.

The Surrey Advertiser, dated 6 May 1922, details the funeral of Mr F A Crisp, JP, Lord of the manor of Little Wenham and Godalming, at Little Wenham church on Saturday 29 April 1922:

The beautiful little old church, which was completely filled, stands on the late Mr Crisp's Suffolk estate, Little Wenham Hall. Until last Saturday, a service had not been held in the finely-preserved old church (built about 1,260AD) for at least 80 years. Less than 20 years ago it was in a very neglected state, but it is now in good substantial repair, thanks to the attention of the late Mr G E Crisp and, in recent years, of his brother, Mr F A Crisp.

Thank you Carole, no-one is as investigative as you! - in the next LINK Carole tells how Little Wenham Church was saved from demolition in the 1890s by one determined individual.


