In his sermon, Bishop Mike asks: "How would you describe a good priest-incharge?"

The good priest is a model of piety, study and action communicating the Christian faith in a gripping way, in a manner deeper than the furrowed brow of Rowan Williams yet funnier than Peter Kay or Michael Macintyre.



The good priest condemns sin but never hurts anyone's feelings. The good priest works from dawn to midnight, is never tired and has a happy family life. The good priest appears to make zilch money, but always wears good clothes, buys decent books regularly, has a lovely hospitable home and gives £100 a week to each of their churches, more during a pandemic.

They are about 26 years old and have been studying the gospels for 30 years. The priest is tall and commands authority, and short and unthreatening; what's more, thin, someone accustomed to the ascetic disciplines of fasting with prayer, and heavy set, a party person who enjoys life and helps us to enjoy it too.

The good priest makes 10 visits a day to needy church people, spends all the time evangelizing the unchurched, especially teenagers, and can always be found on the High Street of every village or on the end of the phone. The good priest is needless to say beautiful or handsome, but in an understated way.

Well I think you get the picture - we can set up fairly unrealistic expectations of our priests - and if we do so there will be disappointments, not least disappointments with ourselves as priests.

Bishop Mike:

Now the Church of England tends not to splash the cash so you're not in danger of getting rich quick, but you might become very religious! But part of your work Sally as priest in charge is to declare that Jesus is Lord, not you, and part of your work is not to pretend you are beyond mistakes and failure but to acknowledge it and to bear it in a way that continues to point to Jesus, that shows you genuinely believe



and live out of his forgiving, loving heart for you.

What is more likely to shine the light of Jesus to the world? Is it perfect people, with problem free lives, walking around with a perpetual smile of trouble-free living? Or is it those who share the troubles of others,



but yet in whom the light of Jesus shines through, come what may? One of the places the light of Jesus shines brightest is where Christians are dealing with real life problems, but somehow not getting beaten down by the way one might do....just like Paul did

So Sally, be a good priest in charge, but as Paul might define one. In other words be someone who depends on Jesus' mercy and grace, even as you shake and sweat be someone whose capacity not to be

crushed or shamed, challenges worldly understandings of success and failure be someone who knows where you're going and lives out of that future even now and be someone who enables others to be all of this too.
